


UNITED STATES SHIP YANCEY LKA 93 SHIP'S HISTORY

The YANCEY was built at Oakland, California. Her keel was laid on 22 May and the ship was launched on 8 July 1944. She was commissioned in October and named for Yancey County, North Carolina.

After commissioning she was assigned to transport cargo to Pearl Harbor. Upon arrival, YANCEY was given duty with the amphibious force, Pacific Fleet, and saw action at Iwo Jima, Okinawa, Hiroshima and in French Indo-China.

In 1946 and 1947 YANCEY participated in the Fourth Byrd Expedition to Antarctica, the largest expedition, of its kind in history.

As part of the Service Force, Pacific Fleet, YANCEY carried cargo throughout the Pacific during the ten years following the Antarctica Expedition, then in 1958 was decommissioned at San Francisco.

YANCEY was recommissioned in November 1961 as part of the late J. F. Kennedy's Fleet Build-Up Program. She was assigned to Norfolk, Virginia to join Amphibious Squadron TWELVE of the Atlantic Fleet.

YANCY participated in training exercises and cargo operations, then in the closing months of 1962 was a proud part of the Cuban Blockade.

In early May of 1963 YANCEY departed from Norfolk with Amphibious Squadron TWELVE for a sixmonth cruise to the Mediterranean.

After completing a regular yard overhaul at the Naval Shipyard, Charleston, South Carolina, in the spring of 1964, YANCEY participated in refresher training exercises at Guantanamo Bay. Thereupon followed preparation for and participation in Steel Pike I, the largest amphibious operation since World War II. YANCEY was one of 80 ships including over 50,000 men which participated in the exercise off the coast of Spain.

While deployed in the Caribbean, the Dominican Crises began. YANCEY was dispatched to Santo Domingo where 593 evacuses from 21 nations were embarded and evacuated to San Juan, arriving on May 1, 1965. A child named Stephen Yancey Paez was born enroute. Returning to Santo Domingo the ship evacuated another 450.

After a summer of cruises to Boston, New York, and Puerto Rico, the ship deployed to the Caribbean in November returning to Norfolk March, 1966. The ship was engaged in Army training, local operations, and deployed to the Mediterranean in November, 1966 as a member of the Amphibious Force, Sixth Fleet. She returned to Norfolk in May, 1967.

Upon completion of a yard overhaul in March, 1968 she passed refresher training at Guantanamo Bay and returned to the active fleet. YANCEY deployed to the Mediterranean in July, 1968. While deployed, she became a unit of Amphibious Squadron TWO. She returned to Little Creek in December, 1968.

YANCEY entered a period of reduced operational status in January 1969. She deployed to Guantanamo Bay, Cuba for refresher training in September 1969. Upon successful completion of "REFTRA" she commanced a period of local operations in preparation for her last Mediterranean deployment in March 1970.

YANCEY will return from this "MED" deployment in August 1970. She is scheduled to enter inactive status in September. She will end her proud twenty-six year career, upon decommissioning, in December 1970.

STORY OF MED. 1 - 70

USS YANCEY (LKA-93) departed Norfolk with Phibron 2 on 17 March heading south for Morehead City, N.C. and the awaiting Marines of BLT 1/8. While on the Eastward transit YANCEY, not noted for her excessive speed, surprised the squadron by rigging sails fore and aft — unfortunately adding very little to her speed. After a calm and otherwise uneventful crossing she arrived in Rota, Spain on 1 April to relieve USS ARNEB (LKA-56) and commence duties as Med 1-70.

YANCEY entered the Med on 2 April and stopped at Malaga, Spain for a week of liberty.

On 9 April the Squadron arrived at Carboneras, Spain for Phiblex 5-70 the first Amphibious landing of the cruise. On the lighter side the crew enjoyed the first of numerous beach parties at many of the training anchorages.

The ship's next liberty port was Genova, Italy where she arrived on 17 April. From here YANCEY continued to Cannes, France for another very enjoyable week of liberty.

Leaving Cannes on 4 May the ship began it's first major exercise, arriving in Lovo Santo, Corsica on 8 May. During this exercise LCDR Robert Glancy relieved LCDR James L. Mansfield as Executive Officer of YANCEY. LCDR Mansfield returned to the States to assume duties with CINCLANTFLT in Norfolk.

During an anchoring at Lovo Santo YANCEY had the unfortunate experience of dropping her anchor — and 180 fathoms of chain with it — into 250 feet of water. It was finally replaced by a new anchor — and chain — which arrived in Athens, Greece.

Returning to Italy on 20 May, YANCEY next visited Naples to combine business and pleasure with a two week stay for liberty and a tender availability with USS SHENANDOAH (AD-26). Here all of the ship's equipment was checked and necessary repairs made for the remainder of the cruise. In Naples the Squadron conducted daily competition in football, softball and basketball with YANCEY winning the basketball trophy with a 4-0 record.

Upon leaving Naples the Squadron embarked on the largest Amphibious operation of the cruise, Dawn Patrol 1-70 from 3 June to 17 June. This exercise included landings in Porto Scudo, Sardinia, Kyparissa, Greece, and Gythion, Greece and was conducted with over 50 ships of various NATO nations. Due to severe ground swells in Porto Scudo the Squadron lost one member, USS AUSTIN (LPD-4) when she lost her stern gate during the landing.

June found YANCEY underway for Athens, Greece, a well deserved port visit, and a rendezvous with a new starboard anchor. She departed for Navplion, Greece and a training anchorage including more shore training for the Marines on 24 June.

Strymon River, Greece was the next stop where another exercise was held commencing 5 July. During this landing USS FORT SNELLING (LSD-30) joined the Squadron as USS AUSTIN's replacement. With Marines still debarked to the beach for training the Squadron split time for liberty in Thessalonika, Greece with YANCEY and FORT SNELLING arriving 13 July.

Upon returning to Strymon River, YANCEY backloaded Marines and equipment and on 17 July began the long transit back to the western Med for the last and one of the best liberty ports, Palma, Mallorca.

On 28 July YANCEY was underway for Rota and OUTCHOP. On 1 August she was relieved by USS RANKIN (LKA-103) and began the westward transit for Morehead City. The YANCEY concluded her last deployment on 13 August when she arrived at Norfolk, Virginia to the smiling faces of loved ones not seen for five months. From this point on it was deactivation for the proud ship with 26 years of Naval service.

COMMANDING OFFICER



CAPT. H. A. HAMBERG, USN

CAPT. H.A. HAMBERG U.S.N.

Captain HAMBERG graduated from the U. S. Naval Academy and was commissioned an Ensign in 1945. His first assignment was aboard the USS PORTSMOUTH (CL 102), in which he served for eighteen months, before entering flight training.

Captain HAMBERG was designated a Naval Aviator in 1948 and was assigned to Patrol Squadron THREE, in Panama. Subsequent tours include instructor at the U. S. Naval Academy, and Transport Squadron SEVEN in Hawaii. He then attended post graduate school at Stanford University, and later served at the Bureau of Naval Personnel and the Naval War College. He served as commanding officer of Air Anti-Submarine Squadron TWENTY-SIX in Norfolk, navigator of the USS RANDOLPH (CVS-15), and as Commander Carrier Anti-Submarine Air Group FIFTY-SEVEN. Captain HAMBERG then served on the Hubbel Pay Study Group and later as head of Manpower Requirements in the department of Naval Operations until January 1968. At this time he reported to Commander Operation Test and Evaluation Force as Special Project Director, after which he served on the staff of Commander Naval Air Force, U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

Captain HAMBERG commanded USS MONTRAIL (LPA-213) prior to assuming command of USS YANCEY (LKA-93) on 2 March 1970.

EXECUTIVE OFFICER



LCDR J. L. MANSFIELD

LCDR MANSFIELD was graduated from Massachusettes Maritime Academy in 1956. He commenced his active duty on board USS ROWE (DD-564). He next served as Maine Propulsion Assistant on USS BOXER (LPH-4).

After one year of staff duty in Keflavik, Iceland, LCDR MANSFIELD served with the Defense Intelligence Agency in Washington, D. C. He was then assigned as First Lieutenant onboard the USS BOSTON (CAG-1). Immediately prior to reporting to YANCEY in December, 1968, LCDR MANSFIELD served as a Battalion Officer at Naval Officer Candidate School, Newport, Rhode Island.

He is now assigned to the Staff of the Commander in Chief, U. S. Atlantic Fleet. LCDR MANSFIELD was selected for Commander in September, 1970. During his tour onboard YANCEY, he guided the ship through a period of Reduced Operational Status and was XO during Refresher Training, Quantanamo Bay, Cuba. He departed the YANCEY in Lovo Santo, Corsica in May 1970.



LCDR R. GLANCY

LCDR GLANCY was commissioned through Naval Officer Candidate School, Newport, Rhode Island. Prior to attending OCS, he had served in the enlisted ranks and had been selected for Chief Petty Officer. His diversified enlisted career included tours of duty onboard the battleship USS MISSOURI in Korea, on the Rhine River Patrol in Germany, with the Materials Handling Depot, Earle, Mississippi and with the Staff of Commander in Chief, U. S. Atlantic Fleet.

LCDR GLANCY first tour of duty as an officer was onboard USS MT. MCKINLEY (AGC-7). He next served as Executive Officer of USS AMHEARST (PCER-853). After a tour with the Enlisted Personnel Distribution Officer, Atlantic, at Bainbridge, Maryland, he served with the Staff of Amphibious Squadron FOUR and with the Chief of Naval Operations, in Washington, D. C.

LCDR GLANCY then served with the U. S. Naval Advisory Group, Saigon and was awarded the Bronze Star for his exceptional performance as In-Country Training Advisor for the South Vietnanese Navy. He then reported as Executive Officer, USS YANCEY. This tour of duty was interrupted when he was chosen to be Executive Officer of the new USS SHREVPORT (LPD-12). He was selected for Commander in September, 1970.

Captain H. Dupre, USMC was YANCEY's Combat Cargo Officer and only Marine permanently attached to the ship. Embarking in Morehead City and joining him were 79 others — 1st LT S. Mathey, 1st LT J. Ellis and 76 enlisted men making up a Medical, and Motor Transport group from Camp LeJune, N. C.

The Mobile Transport Battalion provided mobile support to the Battalion Landing Team during exercises ashore. The Medical Battalion included Navy corpsmen and Marines attached as ambulance drivers and mechanics. This unit set up a field hospital ashore for medical assistance to the BLT.

After USS AUSTIN's unfortunate loss of its sterngate the embarked Marines were shifted to accommodate the groups formerly quartered on AUSTIN. The majority of YANCEY's Medical Battalion left and was replaced by an Engineering Battalion headed by 1st LT D. Sholley.

While underway the Marines were an integral part of the ship, working on mess duty, working parties, baking and cooking, and maintaining cleanliness of the troop compartment. Periodic inspections were held while underway and physical training was as much as possible a part of the daily routine.
