2008 USS YANCEY REUNION REVIEW

The USS Yancev (AKA-93) held its annual reunion on October 2-5. 2008 at the Clarion Seatac Hotel in Seattle, WA. Thirteen of the ship's former crewmen attended along with eleven of their auests.

The reunion started at midday on Thursday, Oct. 2 with the opening of the registration desk and Hospitality Room. The Hospitality Room was the main scene of the reunion, giving a place for everyone to gather and share their stories and memorabilia and to partake of the refreshments that were available throughout each day. Most of the attendees spent the afternoon in the Hospitality Room after getting settled into their rooms and the day passed quickly. Soon it was time for the first official activity of the reunion-the Welcome Reception at 5:00 PM. George Clifton, group coordinator, welcomed everyone to the reunion and then hors d'oeuvres and drinks were served as everyone got acquainted with anyone whom they hadn't met in the Hospitality Room. The remainder of the evening was free to have dinner in the hotel, go into Seattle for some nightlife, or just relax in the Hospitality Room sharing memories with others.

After a hearty breakfast on Friday morning, those who signed up for the Bremerton tour loaded the motor coach to the ferry for a 60 minute ride from Seattle to Bremerton. After the ride across Puget Sound there was a short walk to the museum ship, USS Turner Joy DD-951, the famed Navy destroyer from

the Vietnam War. The ship is now maintained and administered by the Bremerton Historic Ships Association and honors not only the men and women of our modern US Navy, but also recognizes the accomplishments of those who helped build and maintain the Navy's ships as well. After the visit to the USS Turner Joy the group was free to have lunch at any of the near-by restaurants in the area. After the tour returned to the hotel, the remainder of the afternoon was free to relax and visit with friends. Planned activities began again at 6:00 PM with the social hour where favorite beverages could be enjoyed before the dinner buffet at 7:00 PM. After dinner there was again free time to enjoy spending with old shipmates and new friends.

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Saturday's optional tour to take in the sites of Seattle began at 9:00 AM. One of the stops on the tour was the famous Space Needle, whose observation deck gives one a spectacular view of Seattle's beauty. From the Space Needle the tour went on to Pike Place Market, a public market overlooking Elliott Bay. The market opened in 1907 and is one of the oldest continuallyoperated public farmer's market in the United States. It is a place of business for many small farmers, craftspeople and merchants. It is also Seattle's most popular tourist destination. The Market is also home to nearly 500 low income residents who live in 8 different buildings throughout the Market. The Market is run by the quaisgovernment Pike Place Market Preservation and Development Authority. Throughout the Market were many places to choose for lunch, so if anyone went away hungry, it was not because of lack of choice of places to eat. After lunch the tour continued on to the Museum of Flight at Boeing Field, the largest aviation museum on the west coast. This was one of the favorite tours of the reunion, especially for the men. The tour returned to the hotel in time for the 3:30 business meeting, where the 2009 reunion site was selected to be Mobile, Alabama. The 2010 reunion will be either Wilmington, NC or Boston, MA. George Clifton was again elected to serve as the Association President/ Coordinator. After the business meeting, most people retreated to their room to get ready for the evening's big event—the USS Yancey (AKA-93) banguet. The pre-dinner cocktail hour and photo session began at 6:00 PM. Individual, couple and group pictures were taken and then it was time for dinner. The USS Yancey (AKA-93) banquet began with the playing of the National Anthem and the Pledge of Allegiance. Sunday morning's Memorial Service to remember all USS Yancev shipmates who have passed away was held after breakfast. With the closing of the Memorial Service, the 2008 reunion came to a close. Good byes, hugs and plans to meet in Mobile in 2009 were seen and heard from every corner of the room. MAIL CALL

USS Yancey (AKA-93) Locating the Ship's Bell and Builder's Plates

Today's story is the continuing mystery of: "Where are the USS Yancey Ship's Bell and Builder's Plate?" It begins several years ago when I spoke to the North Carolina Wreck Diving Webmaster about how great his "AR302" photos were. We chatted about where (on the Yancey) his photos viewed (and corrected a 'vent' caption showing the main deck access to the Mess Deck, fwd., portside, #3 hold), and I asked if the Ship's Bell or Builder's Plates were still there, on-board and underwater.

He didn't recall, so I described them and where they were located. The Ship's Bell, in the forecastle (not the small bright-plated quarterdeck bell) and two Builder's plates—one on the 01-level outside the forward Wardroom bulkhead, and the other on the forward Engineroom bulkhead above the watch station & board. I had stared at the Engineroom Builder's Plate forever: Brass, with

black-painted engraved text "Hull 280, Moore Drydock, Oakland, Calif., launched July 8, 1944"- or words to that effect. But, again, he didn't recall, but thought not.

Time marched on, and last year about this time, while surfing the Washington Navy Yard web-site, I read that when U.S. Navy ships are scrapped, their Ship's Bell and Builder's Plates are archived at the Washington Navy Yard Archives. Too late to organize any visit during the Yancey Reunion in Washington, I wrote the MLRS anyway, suggesting a visit. Didn't happen...And for the best...Nothing was there.

Time marched on some more, to this summer, and after e-mail exchanges and speaking with the Washington Navy Yard Archiver curator, I learned that:

- The bright-plated quarterdeck bell was never received (and perhaps 'liberated' by the last Captain or at a last Shipyard)
- 'Ditto for the Builder's Plates there's no record they were ever received by the Archives; but
- The Ship's Bell is presently on loan, as the Archives does, sometimes to the Naval Technical Training Center in Meridian, Mississippi. The curator sent a photo of presently located and rigged Bell

So, to all "Sherlock Holmes" types among the Yancey Crewmen:

- Does anyone live in Meridian, Mississippi that could take a photo, video and/or audio (striking 8 bells) of the Yancey
- Does anyone know any contact information for the last USS Yancey CO (to contact about the quarterdeck bell and plates—for photos of)?
- Does anyone know the contact information for "Yancey County, NC" or "last shipyard"?

Inquiring minds want to know (and try to gather audio-visual Bell and Plates records for crewmen).

MOBILE, AL IN 2009

The 2009 USS Yancey reunion will be held in Mobile, Alabama and we need your help in choosing the attractions you would like to see on your agenda. Please read the descriptions of the attractions and then fill out and return the survey to ML&RS, Inc and we'll get started on the plans for your reunion.

ATTRACTIONS

Cathedral of Immaculate Conception—Located in downtown Mobile, this cathedral was built between 1835-1849, and is listed as one of Mobile's oldest churches. It occupies the site used by Mobile's first settlers as a burial ground. Beautiful stained-glass windows and polished marble designs decorate the basilica.

Fort Conde—Mobile's welcome center was built in the early 1700s as a French fort. Reconstructed and furnished as it appeared in 1702, the fort features facsimiles of 18th century artillery demonstrated by costumed tour guides. Museum rooms detail past Mardi Gras celebrations and the origins of the city.

The Estuarium at the Dauphin Island Sea Lab—This beautiful aquarium, with exciting visual displays and engaging interactive activities, will give you a first-hand view of the ecosystems of the Mobile Bay area. From the swamps of the Delta to the waters of Mobile Bay, from the sands of the Barrier Islands to the reefs of the Gulf of Mexico, the Estuarium offers a lively educational experience for everybody. Other exhibits include the Living Marsh Boardwalk, the Miss May May, the Weather Station and much, much more.

Bragg-Mitchell Mansion— This beautifully restored pre-Civil War mansion demonstrates both Greek Revival and Italianate influence. Fifteen-foot ceilings and a dramatic curved staircase contribute to the sense of splendor.

Mobile Greyhound Park— Alabama's oldest Greyhound park features both dog and horse racing. You can watch the races from the tracks or the grandstand.

Bellingrath Gardens and Home— Coca-Cola bottling founder Walter Bellingrath and his wife, Bessie, opened their private garden estate in 1932 and the result has become one of the most popular tourist destinations in the South. The Gardens cover 65 acres and feature a yearround blooming schedule of tulips, azaleas, roses, mums, poinsettias and so much more. It has been chosen as one of the top three gardens by readers of Southern Living magazine. The Bellingrath Home is the first Alabama home to be featured on A&E's "American Castles".

River Cruise Aboard the Southern Belle—The 150-passenger Southern Belle offers fun, scenic 45-minute cruises on Fowl River from Bellingrath Gardens landing.

Battleship Memorial Park—Voyage through time and revisit an era of adventure and bravery as you tour the many exhibits. Visit USS ALABAMA, the recipient of nine World War II Battle Stars. Her crew of 2,500 saw action in the Atlantic for a year before joining the Pacific Fleet in mid-1943. She fought at such key locations as Leyte, the Gilbert Islands, and Okinawa, and then led the American Fleet into Tokyo Bay in September 1945.

Also at the park is the submarine **USS DRUM**, "Calamity Jane", a B-52 Stratofortress that served with SAC and the A-12 "Blackbird" spyplane. In the Aircraft Pavilion you'll see a gull-winged Corsair and the P51-D Mustang Redtail, the plane flown by the valiant Tuskegee Airmen. Then inspect other aircraft from Korea, Vietnam and Desert Storm. The park also includes a rose garden, gift shop, flight simulator and much more.

Pensacola National Museum of Naval Aviation- The premier Naval Aviation Museum in the country. If you have any interest at all in aviation this is a must see. There is also an IMAX movie theater where aviation or navy related (usually) are shown.

Fort Barrancas- Also located in Pensacola, this is a very interesting old fort dating back to the Civil War. As you walk in the underground revetments you can imagine being an infantryman defending against a ground assault, with the primary objective of keeping enemy (Union) ships out of the harbor.


